A Short History

Loreto Fermoy has been educating girls for more than 160 years.

In 1853, the Loreto sisters founded a school for girls at Mount St. John, Fermoy. At the beginning, the school catered for junior and senior pupils, both boarders and day pupils.



Some significant dates in the history of Loreto Fermoy:

- 1969: Our school became the voluntary secondary school for girls in the area.
- 1993: The boarding school closed.
- 2003: A further extension and sports hall were completed.

The school is one of eighteen Loreto Secondary Schools in Ireland. All Loreto schools maintain links through inter-school co-operation and events. Today, our students enjoy modern facilities in our school while also appreciating the heritage of the founding sisters in the beautiful chapel and old hall.





Educational Programmes



Transition Year

Transition Year bridges the gap between junior and senior cycle and provides an excellent foundation for the Leaving Certificate. Transition Year is optional at our school but we currently have over 80% uptake for this programme.

Our students study all the core academic subjects:	English, Irish, Maths, French or German, Careers, Religion, Computer Studies, Debating/ Public Speaking, Life Coaching & Work Experience
Modules:	Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Agricultural Science, Business, Accounting, Economics, History, Geography, P.E., Home Economics, Archiving & Desktop Publishing
Options:	Film Production, Social Innovation Programme, Enterprise Education & Mini-Company, Art, Music & Drama, Spanish, Mandarin Chinese.

Our broad holistic curriculum supports students in the development of life skills, social competence and a self-directed approach to learning. Students also participate in work experience, social placement and outdoor pursuits trips. Our programme is further complemented by regular guest speakers, workshops and educational excursions.

Students on this programme regularly enter complementary events & competitions such as the Gaisce, Young Scientist Exhibition, Junk Kouture, Student Enterprise Awards, Cork Film Festival & Fresh Film, Milk It & Dragons Den.







Leaving Certificate Applied

Leaving Certificate Applied is a two-year Leaving Certificate available to students who wish to follow a practical or vocational programme. Students spend four days a week in school and one full day on work experience. This prepares them for adult and working life.

The students' work is assessed over the two years of the programme and they earn credits for completed work.

Subjects: English and Communication, Mathematical Applications, Irish, Italian, Leisure and Recreation, Religion, Art, Childcare, Hair and Beauty, Careers and Social Education.





Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme

L.C.V.P. Link Modules is an extra subject in the established Leaving Certificate. The programme aims to prepare students for the world of work and enterprise. It is recognised by universities as part of the points system.

- ➤ 60% of the Leaving Certificate marks are awarded for a portfolio compiled in class over the two years. The final examination is held at the beginning of May and is thus, completed before the other exams.
- Local businesses and Junior Achievement Ireland support the programme by facilitating site visits, work placements and guiding students on curriculum vitae and interview preparation.

Pastoral Care

The most important thing for us in Loreto is that each of our students should feel happy and secure here. Our structures highlight the importance we place on the well-being of our students.

- A Youth Leader is assigned to each first year student to help her to make the transition from primary to secondary school. Organised activities on Induction Day help the first years to get to know each other.
- > Each class elects a Cairdeas group of up to six students. The Cairdeas group fosters the inclusion of all girls in their class.
- Class tutors care for individual classes.
- Each year has a Year Head.
- Junior cycle students study Social, Personal and Health Education.
- Opportunities for spiritual growth and development are provided by the Religion Department and school chaplain. Retreat or reflection days are organised for all year groups.
- Awareness campaigns and workshops promote positive mental health and self-esteem.

Learning Support

As a school we value each student for herself without consideration of intellectual or other ability. Appreciation of personal goals and diversity of ability is part of our Loreto ethos. Special education in the school is guided by these values.

In the learning support context, students are taught in small groups, so specific learning needs are more easily identified and individual help given.

Guidance

The Guidance Department helps all students with subject choice, study plans and examination techniques. Students are made aware of the range of careers, courses and colleges available to them after secondary school. Students are given the opportunity to take aptitude tests and to complete career interest questionnaires.

- Individual appointments are available for all students to discuss educational, career, social or personal issues.
- Visiting speakers talk to students about career issues and students are offered the opportunity to visit colleges on open days.
- Parents/guardians are invited to attend information evenings on applying to college, subject choice and the transition for primary to secondary school.

Student Council

The main aim of the Student Council is to promote the interests of the school and the involvement of students in the affairs of the school in co-operation with the Board of Management, parents, and teachers. This partnership works for the benefit of the school and its students. The Student Council consists of a representative of each class and an Executive Committee of senior pupils. The executive committee works with a liaison teacher and meets once a week. The whole Student Council meets at regular intervals throughout the year.

Parents' Association

The Loreto Family Parents' Association holds an Annual General Meeting in the first term each year. At this meeting, a committee is elected and this committee meets once a month during the school year. The Parents' Association organises invaluable fundraising events and also brings speakers on topical issues to the school.

Parents' Involvement

- Parent-teacher meetings are held once a year for each group.
- Reports are sent out twice yearly.
- Parents are kept informed of school activities by text and by letters sent through pupils in the course of the year.
- A school year calendar is distributed to pupils in September.
